In the morning, by the time the seventh green was reached, Mr. Hincks had gained a lead of four, which was increased to seven on the 11th green. Mr. Arbuckle seemed as if he could do nothing right except drive a beautiful ball from the tee, and things were looking pretty bad for his chances. However, the one man who was not affected was the player and he took the 12th hole in five, the 13th with a long put, halved the 15th in five and by an excellent drive and a long iron shot. which laid the ball within ten feet of the pin, obtained the 16th and pulled the score back to only 4 up in favor of Mr. Hincks.


Mr. Hincks was out of bounds with his drive to the 17th, and on playing his second into the rough gave up and the score was 3 up. However, he gained the 18th and the first round ended 4 up to his credit.

On the second round the leader took the 1st hole in 3 by excellent golf. Mr. Arbuckle was lucky to win the second, as in playing his approach he hit a "runner" which jumped the bunker but thoroughly deserved his 3 at the 3rd. Mr. Hincks was decidedly lucky in halving the fourth as he hit the railing hard and the ball bounced back to the edge of the green. Score 3 up to Mr. Hincks.

Excellent Playing

The fifth was halved in 5 and the 6th in 4, and then for the second time Mr. Arbuckle found his drive lying behind the whin and lost the hole. However he won the next and once more Mr. Hincks stood 3 up. This lead he increased to 4, 5 and 6 up at the three succeeding holes, and the match looked as good as over, as Mr. Hincks was playing with the elan that brings success in its train.

Mr. Arbuckle, however, did not take that view. He took the 12th in four, the 13th in 6 and the 14th in 3 in the presence of a large crowd who had just watched the end of the professionals' round. The 15th was halved and away they went through the trees with Mr. Hincks 3 up. An excellent iron shot close to the flag gave Mr. Arbuckle the 16th and, his opponent putting his drive to the 17th and also third shot out of bounds, enabled him to reduce the odds against him to 1 up with one to go. The crowd held their breath as each

shot was played. Both made good drives but Mr. Arbuckle, with his second, lay away to the right while Griggs of Tacoma. Mr. Hincks was just under the brow of the hill and straight. Both missed their put and then Mr. Hincks, playing the like, got down in 5, winning by two on the 36 holes.

It was a great match and both winner and loser, and especially the latter, proved themselves great players. Mr. Arbuckle's physique and imperturbability should enable him to do considerable better scoring in the future but he will never play a losing fight better as long as he lives.

The Open Championship was left to the professionals yesterday, and the keenest interest was shown as to whether one of them would succeed in beating 300 for the 72 holes. The visitors seemed to find some of the holes too awe-inspiring, "Too much trouble in sight", as one of them said, and Mr. J. M. 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
