#### McCarthy Quits Job With Club Facing Red Sox Series

Associated Press Sports Writer BOSTON, May 25. - The dream of almost every majorleague baseball star from Babe Ruth down—to succeed the fabulous Joe McCarthy as manager of the New York Yankees—today came true for Bill Dickey, for 17 years one of the club's most skilled and faithful players.

Rated season after season as one of the greatest catchers in history, the Little Rock, Ark.-born Dickey, who will be 39 years old next month, was placed in charge of his beloved Bronx Bombers shortly after President Larry MacPhail received. Wa Carthy's telegraphed eived McCarth'y's telegraphed

resignation from his Buffalo home.
McCarthy, who, while piloting the
Yanks since 1931, led them to eight American League pennants and seven world championships, told MacPhail that his physical condition rould not permit him to continue vith the Yankees.

"My physician advises that my health would be seriously jeopard-ized if I continue as manager of the Yankees and this is the sole reason for my decision which, as you know entirely voluntary on my part, the McCarthy resignation read.

After being introduced by Mac Phail during a hastily arranged press conference as "the manage of the Yankees for the rest of the 1946 season and for all of 1947,"
Dickey took over on a humble note

MacPhail said that the veteran


