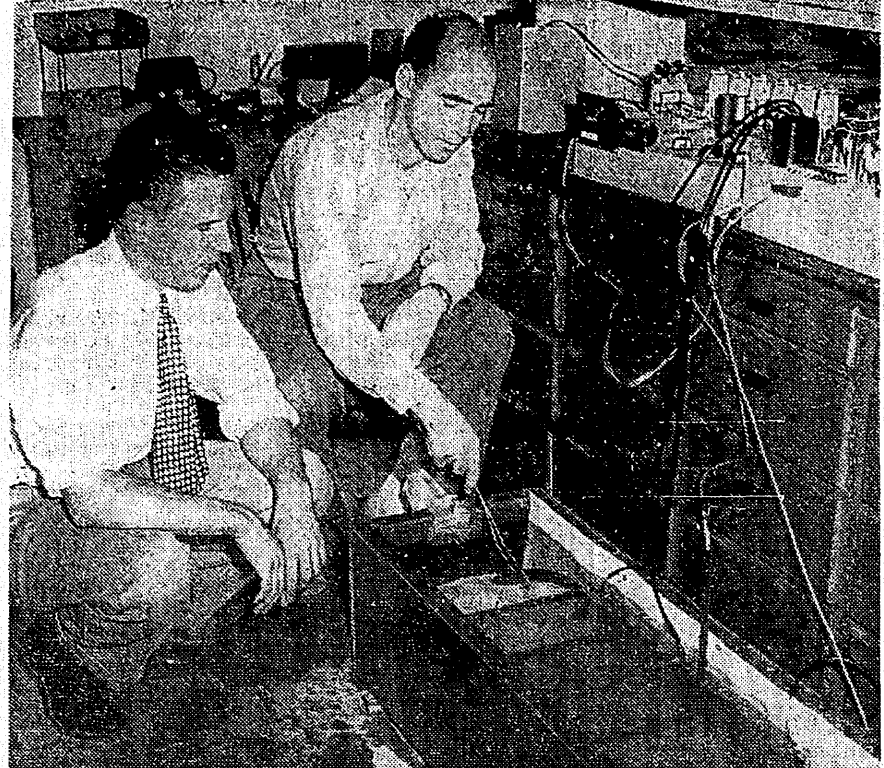

## Inside on The Outdoors: Electronics Is Aid To Counting Fish

"Sammy," a rainbow trout is helping the Montlake Laboratory of the Fish and Wildlife Service to invent an electronic fish counter.

We watched this revolutionary device in operation this week. "Sammy" swam back and forth through a plastic funnel while the almost-human machine clicked off a count for each passage through.

This is the first time such a counter has been developed in the United States, although a similar device is in the process of development in Scotland.

Charles Volz, an electronic specialist has had the idea for a counter, has had the idea for the past three years. The first scale model was developed last spring. The counter has been in actual operation for less than a month.

The model consists of a transparent plastic tunnel about three feet long placed in a white-lined box. It is connected to one of those complicated electronic "brains." Electrodes, one at each end and one in the center, carry electricity through the tunnel.

When no fish are going through the tunnel, there is a balanced circuit. As fish swim through, they change the resistance of the water between the three electrodes, thus causing the electronic circuit in the machine to count the fish with an audible click and register it on a counter.

Fish Conduct Electricity. The principle of the device is that a fish conducts electricity more easily than water. As

it swims through the tunnel, it upsets the delicate balance of the electrodes thus causing the machine to "count" its passage. The "brain" is so set up that it counts a fish going up stream on one dial and a fish swimming down stream on another. Only the fish that go completely through are counted.

Clint Atkinson, chief of the Pacific salmon investigation program of the Fish and Wildlife Service, said the counter will be of tremendous importance to every fish biologist in the country. The present model is constructed to be used in fishways in dams. At the present time, the only method used to count fish over a dam is to have a trained person sit there and count each individual fish. Such counting is not done at night and much of the fish movement may be lost.

The new electronic counter is entirely automatic and will work day and night. Atkinson said that counting weirs in streams may hold back fish to the time when personnel are available to let them through as they are counted. Counts of fish ascending a stream are extremely valuable in fishery management. Counts help to set up checks for annual comparisons. Counts show the number of adult fish going to the spawning grounds. Counts aid fishery men to predict the cycle returns of future runs.

Volz stated that the next step in the counter is an attachment that will take a picture of each fish as it goes through. This part is nearly ready for testing. It will aid in species identification.

A full scale model of the

counter is being taken this week to the Zosel Dam and the Okanogan River, which carries one of the most important sockeye runs in Washington. Julius Rockwell is in charge of the work and will install the counter.

Cantrell To Drive In Auto Race

The midge cars of the highway—the sports cars—will compete Sunday at the Kitsap Country Airport, Bremerton, in the second annual Seafair sports-car races.

More than 70 drivers already have entered, and officials expect a field of 100 on race day.

Outstanding cars and drivers from most of the Western states will compete. Listed among the top drivers in the feature of the four-race program, the Seafair Trophy race, is Bill Cantrell.

Cantrell is better known to speedsters racing fans as "Wild Bill," driver of Gale IV, in the Gold Cup races.

One of the top Seattle entries in the Seafair race is Ken Durango in his Austin-Healey. A Ferrari 166, owned and driven by I. E. Lozano, Jr., Los Angeles, Calif., also is recognized as one of the cars to beat.

Spectators' vantage points will be clear for most of the 3.9-mile course, as hills on both sides of the race course provide a natural amphitheater.

Cars represented will be Jaguar, M. G., Triumph, Porsche, Austin-Healey, Ferrari, O. S. C. A., Allard, Kurtis and specials.

## Draper Outlasts Pros For Pacific N. W. Golf Crown

The last, long nine holes told the story as Eddie Draper, Sand Point amateur who holds the Seattle city title, outlasted a group of professionals in the late stages of the 72-hole marathon at Inglewood yesterday afternoon to win the Pacific Northwest open golf crown.

The former Washington state amateur champion went into those last nine holes a stroke behind Ocky Eliason, Tacoma driving-range pro, and a stroke ahead of Stan Leonard, Vancouver, B. C. veteran, who won the regional event 17 years ago in his amateur days.

Eliason, who had been among the front runners since the tournament opened Monday, soared to a 38-two over-par on that last nine to finish with 288, helped by a brilliant chip shot that sank for a birdie 4 on the final hole.

Leonard's par 36 brought him home on even terms with Eliason and with Joe Greer of Yakima, who had dropped from the clouds with a 71 for the last 18 holes.

Draper, meanwhile, playing along with Eliason, had slipped a stroke to par with a 5 on the tenth hole. A birdie 3 at the 11th brought him back to par for the incoming trip. He maintained an even-par gait for the next four holes to remain very much in the running.

Then Eddie dropped putts of around 12 feet on the 16th and

17th for birdies and his par 5 on the home three strokes in front of the pro group and seven under par for the 72-hole journey.

Leonard, Eliason and Greer had the consolation of splitting the first three money awards, which meant a matter of \$566.67 apiece.

Meanwhile, Bruce Cudd, the Portland amateur who had won the Western title ten days before at Broadmoor and who was defending the Pacific Northwest open crown, was having trouble

with his putter. Two strokes from the front with 143 at the halfway mark, he compiled 74-72 yesterday to end up with 289.

That was a stroke better than Eddie Hogan of Portland and Tom Boucher of Seattle totaled to divide fourth and fifth cash splits.

Starting out yesterday morning's third round, Leonard appeared to have the title and the top money award right in his lap by going eagle, birdie, birdie for the first three holes. But Stan slipped here and there the rest of the way, particularly at the 15th hole, where he shoved his second shot to an unplayable lie in the timber and had to take a bogey 6 where birdie 4's were common.

CHICAGO, Aug. 5.—Harold Williams, 34, who owns a golf course in Tuscaloosa, Ala., stroked a five-under-par 67 for the early-round lead in the all-American tourney today.

The sixth finisher in the field of 136 pros starting the 72-hole test over Tam O'Shanter's sun-splashed acres, Williams missed an ace by an inch on the 150-yard 11th hole.

With more than half the field home, Williams held a one-stroke lead over several 68 shooters. Those included Flory Van Donck, Brussels, Peter Thomson of Melbourne, Australia, Jerry Barber of La Canada, Calif., and Rudy Roth of Windsor, Ont.

Williams plays the bigger meets on the professional circuit while his wife, tends his Meadowbrook course in Tuscaloosa, using Mrs. Williams' putter, he took only 23 putts today as he went out in 34 and came home in 33 for the par 36-72 course.

The United States open champion, Ed Furgol, had trouble with his short game and finished with a 73. Lloyd Mangrum, pro at the host club and 1953 winner, was one of the last to tee
