

'Hurricane' Throws Ez For a Loss

SYRACUSE, N.Y. (AP) — Tommy (Hurricane) Jackson, a tireless dancing man, swarmed over Ezard Charles Wednesday night and shook off the former champion's heavy bombs to win a unanimous decision in a fiercely-fought 10-round match at War Memorial Auditorium. Charles weighed 191 1/2, Jackson 191 1/2.

The perpetual motion kid from New York jugged in his corner, did knee bends and calisthenics and shuffled "off to Buffalo" while Charles plodded on, looking for the one punch that might end it.

Although the 34-year-old Charles hit Jackson with everything he had, landed cleanly on the chin with his right and dug the left to the body, he never could bring him down. Instead of dropping, the hurricane man would fade back for a second and then resume his constant flitting job. In the final round they really went at it, Charles shooting the works with every punch he threw.

But, at the end, while they were waiting for the decision, the Hurricane was dancing around, shadow boxing in his red, white and blue robe and looking as mad as a wet hen because he couldn't fight 15 or 20 more rounds. Referee Ruby Goldstein scored it 6-4, judge Dick Fazio had it 8-2 and judge Ted Shiels 6-2-2 all for Jackson. The AP card was for Jackson, 6-4.

The eager Boston Red Sox cooled off the league leading Chicago White Sox 6-4 Wednesday and the Cleveland Indians evened their series with the New York Yankees 2-1 to tighten the already pressure-packed American League race.

The day's developments left only three games separating the first and fourth clubs with Detroit pressing close behind.

The Red Sox upended the White Sox on Jackie Jensen's two-run double in the eighth inning, breaking a 4-4 deadlock.

Gene Woodling, a former Yankee, provided the big blow for the Indians, poling a two-run homer in the fourth inning for his team's only runs.

The game was marked by some superb pitching on the part of both Mike Garcia, the winner, and the Yankees' Bob Turley, the loser. Both were relieved in the ninth inning but not before turning in masterful performances.

Triple Victory
Garcia gave up four hits in eight innings. He was replaced in the ninth by Don Mossi after Mickey Mantle had opened with a single. Mossi himself later was replaced by Ray Narleski who struck out Eddie Robinson to end the game.

Turley, walking eight and fanning eight, allowed only three hits in his eight-inning tenure. He went out for a pinchhitter and was replaced in the ninth by Jim Konstanty.

Jensen's dramatic winning blow came off reliever Dixie Howell. It landed in right center with nobody close.

Fifth place Detroit hung on, beating Washington 3-0 on Frank Lary's two-hitter to stay 3 1/2 games behind Boston. Fred Hatfield homered and Frank House had two RBIs behind the rookie's tight hurling.

Kansas City and Baltimore split a two-night pair. Rookie Bob Hale delivered a two-run pinch double in the ninth for a 4-3 Baltimore decision in the first game. The A's scored three in the first inning to breeze home, 5-1, in the nightcap.

In the National, Gil Hodges and Don Zimmer each homered twice as Brooklyn clubbed Milwaukee 9-6 and regained a 1 1/2-game lead. New York topped St. Louis 5-3; Philadelphia scored eight runs in the sixth to belt Cincinnati 8-4, and Chicago split with Pittsburgh, winning 5-4 in 12 innings after a 3-2 defeat.

Hodges' clouts were good for six runs in the Dodger romp, with his first a grand-slammer in the first inning. It was his 11th bases-loaded shot, one short of the NL record held by Rogers Hornsby and Ralph Kiner.

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Torrid Eliason Powers to NW Open Victory

Boucher Ties For Second, 5 Strokes Off

Tacoma's golfing pro, Ockie Eliason sprinted down the final 18 holes in 68 strokes Wednesday to outdistance the field and win the Northwest Open golf tournament at the Walla Walla Country Club.

His 72-hole total was 277. Leading Walla Walla's Tom Boucher by only one stroke after 54 holes, Eliason poured in three birdies on the outgoing nine in the afternoon and added another on the last lap. He was not over par on any hole in his final 18.

Par Not Enough
Boucher had to settle for a second place tie at 282 with Professional Ken Towns, Ft. Lewis, who also was four under par for Wednesday's 36 holes. Boucher, after breathing down Eliason's neck at the brunch-break, came home in par 72.

The victory was worth \$800 to Eliason while Boucher and Towns each pocketed \$450.

A stroke back was Bud Hofmeister, Hayden Lake, whose 283 total was one better than that posted by two veteran Northwest campaigners, Joe Greer, Yakima, and Chuck Congdon, Tacoma.

Hofmeister earned \$330, Greer and Congdon, \$260.

Four pros at par 288 included Cliff Whittle, Twin Falls, Idaho; Joe Steiger, Spokane; George Puget, Renton, and Harold West, Eugene, Ore.

Lenny Stroup, 20-year-old assistant at the host club, was just three strokes off Eliason's pace after 54 holes but lost out to "first tourney" jitters on the final 18 and ended with 293.

Low amateur honors went to Art Abrahamson, Everett, not much bigger than his oversize golf bag, who carded 288.

Jim Shirver, Seattle, had 291 for runner-up honors.

Eliason seldom strayed from the straight and narrow, particularly on the final 18, when he hit most of the greens in standard figures and appeared content to protect his lead. In the morning round he had three birdies but also three bogies.

It was Eliason's first major tournament victory in the Northwest. Last year he tied for first professional money in the same event won by Amateur Eddie Draper.

Roy Moe, Spokane, won a special 36-hole senior tournament for PGA members over 50 years of age.

Runners-up in the tourney were Joe Moe, Portland; Bob Pinnell, Sunnyside, and Ted Longworth, Portland. The four men split \$150 prize money.

After closing the gap on the winner at the 54-hole mark, Boucher had his troubles on the final 18. Most of his tee shots strayed toward trouble, and on several occasions he had to sacrifice a stroke because of trees.

His putter, however, kept him in the running, and more than once he ran down putts of 35 to 40 feet.

Jim Russell, the host pro who was not far off the pace at the midway point Tuesday, had his difficulties in the third 18 hole round, and totaled 78 in the morning. He came back with a 74 in his final round.

Clark Has 295
Two local amateurs finished among the "first 10." Reed Clark, Jr., was only four over par for the day's 36 holes, and led the delegation with 295, good for fifth among the simon pures. Jack Sias, current club champion at the tourney course, totaled 301 to share a three-way tie for 10th.

Probably the best effort by a threesome in the entire tournament came in Wednesday morning's round on the 16th hole, where pros Sid Harman and Al Williams and amateur Dick Sheppard carded two eagles and a birdie, a total of five under par on the hole. Harman, former pro at the host club, picked up after 54 holes.

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
