

# Putter Fails Haskell; Tacoman Wins Title

TACOMA, July 23.—When your putter fails, your golf game fails. Dick Haskell, professional from Seattle's Jefferson Park golf course, was three strokes ahead of the pack yesterday with 13 holes remaining of the 72-hole battle of the open-championship of the Pacific Northwest and cash that goes with it.

But on the 13 holes Haskell's mastery of the ball deserted him, especially on and around the greens of Fircrest's testing acres. The result was that Al Feldman, Tacoma pro in his mid-forties, not only wiped out the three strokes by which Dick had led, but finished seven shots out in front of Haskell, while several other contestants slipped in between them.

## Feldman Couldn't Miss

Feldman was rolling in putts from all conceivable distances and making superb chips over traps right on the stick. Haskell three-putted several greens and missed putts as short as 20 inches.

From the sixth through the 14th hole of the closing round, Feldman, although both one under par for the distance, gained nine strokes in nine consecutive holes on Haskell, with whom he was playing.

At the 17th, Haskell missed a putt of less than two feet and Feldman gained another stroke, his tenth for the round, to finish in 283, one under par.

## Congdon Has Best Rounds

Okkie Eliason, another Tacoma pro, who had been seeking his third-straight title, came charging from behind on yesterday's two rounds with 72-69 over the par-71 course for 287, good enough to earn him a tie with Ken Still, also of Tacoma, for second place.

Charley Congdon, dean of

Tacoma pros, put on a characteristic comeback with the two best rounds yesterday, 70-68, for 288 and a tie with Lyle Crawford of Vancouver, B. C., and Bill Welch of Kennewick.

Tied for low amateur award at 289 were Gordon MacKenzie of Vancouver, B. C., Seattle University star; Jack Baty, Tacoma city champion, and Bob Pratt of Renton and Houston University. With them was Tom Marlowe, Portland pro.

Haskell finished even with Ken Storey, Seattle amateur, at 290, receiving \$160 for eighth money prize, while Feldman took down \$800 for first.

Davis ran the 120-yard hurdles in 13.4 despite the handicap of a grass surface and an uphill course. He set the world record in the United States Olympic team trials.

# Manager, 3 Boxers Barred for Deception

MILWAUKEE, July 23.—after a hearing of almost five hours on charges that the Commission yesterday voted four "conducted themselves in a manner detrimental to the best interests of boxing and the public."

The commission heard the testimony of Dazkiewicz and read letters from the three boxers, who did not travel to Milwaukee for the hearing because of "financial difficulties."

The three boxers are Lyle Huffa, who fought here under the name of Tom Nassif; Jack Schoen, who used the name of Danny Dillon; and Ed Dorsey, who signed his contract as Al Irwin.

All three were knocked out in less than one round. The deception was discovered when a Minneapolis sports writer commented on the poor showing by Nassif, Irwin and Dillon. When Nassif, Irwin and Dillon learned of this, they informed the sports writer they weren't even in Milwaukee July 2.

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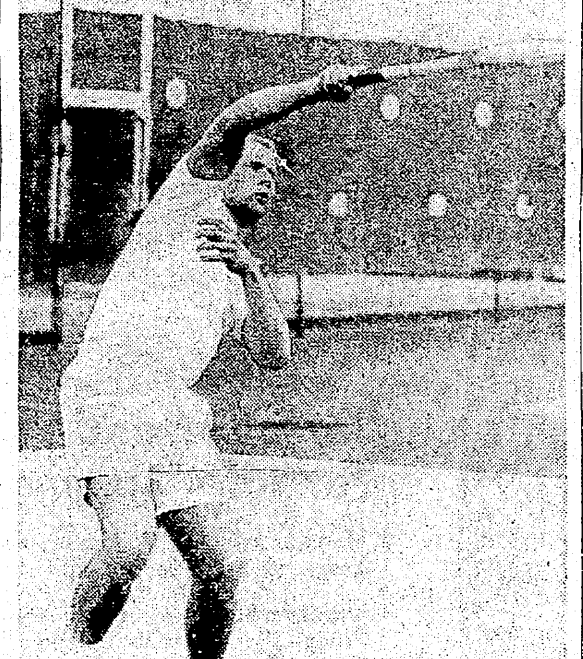
## Form triumphed yesterday.
