

Jenson Flares Up Over Weigh-in Time For Title Fight

IBADAN, Nigeria, Aug. 1. — (A.P.) — The smoldering feud between the managers of Dick Tiger and Gene Fullmer flared anew today over the timing of the weigh-in for the world middle-weight-championship bout.

Jack Solomons, promoter, announced that the weigh-in was scheduled for 10 o'clock Saturday morning.

Marv Jenson, Fullmer's manager, reacted angrily and snapped:

"Is this some more of Bobby Diamond's dirty work?"

Diamond co-manages Tiger, the champion. Diamond and Jenson first clashed Sunday night when the West Jordan, Utah, challenger arrived in Nigeria.

"We hear Tiger is having trouble making the 160-pound middle-weight limit," said Jenson. "If the weigh-in is at 10, he can go without breakfast to make the weight and then have a meal with plenty of time to spare before the fight."

The third meeting between the two was set for about 7:30 o'clock Saturday.

Jenson strode angrily out of his hotel room after Solomons told him of the weigh-in arrangements. Jenson calmed down and returned in a few minutes saying:

"We are in Nigeria now and we will do things the way they want here."

The two fighters, meanwhile, continued their training routine.

Pa. Ring Group Clears Way For Title Bout

PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 1. — (A.P.) — The Pennsylvania Athletic Commission and two promoters opened the way today for a September 30 championship fight in Philadelphia between Sonny Liston, heavyweight titleholder, and Cassius Clay.

Commissioner Alfred M. Klein told a news conference that Bob Nilon of Chester, Pa., has agreed that he and his brother, Jim, will promote the fight as individuals if the commission grants them a license.

Klein said the commission is ready to grant such a license when application is made.

In Harrisburg yesterday the commission rejected an application for a license from Intercontinental Promotions, Inc., in which Liston is a 47½ per cent stockholder. The Nilon brothers also own 47½ per cent of Intercontinental.

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Tee Shots Save N.W. Title for Duden

EVERETT, Aug. 1.—Bob Duden finally got his croquet-putter working, but his putting wasn't the primary reason the Portland veteran reigned today as Northwest open golf champion.

Duden, who won the title by three shots over Bill Eggers, attributed his fine play to accuracy off the tee.

"I putted fairly well today," Duden said after yesterday's 36 holes. "But I don't believe I missed a fairway during the

last three rounds — and that helps."

DUDEN NEEDED both accuracy and some pressure putting yesterday to hold off a strong challenge by Eggers, the Portland strongman who plays out of Henderson, Nev.

Duden fired rounds of 69-68 to finish at 275, 13 strokes under par, over Everett Golf Club's narrow, rain-soaked course. Eggers wound up with a 67, including a five-under-par 30 on the front nine, for a 278 total. Duden pocketed \$800, Eggers \$500.

At the 14th, Duden capped Eggers' birdie putt with one of his own, then dropped a 12-foot, sidehill curlier on the 15th to assure his second Northwest open victory.

Since most of the gallery was following the Duden-Eggers duel, Storey played the best golf of the tournament virtually unnoticed. The Chief-Club's narrow, rain-soaked ace carded seven birdies, only one with a putt of more than six feet, to establish a record on the revised Everett course.

ANOTHER AMATEUR, Clyde Sniffen of Paine Field, was seven strokes behind Duden at 282 and missed sharing amateur honors with Storey and Richards by one shot.

Don Bies, who defeated Duden for the title in a playoff last year, made a strong comeback after a shaky start to tie for sixth with Stan Leonard, Vancouver, B.C. Bies, assistant Seattle Golf Club pro, had rounds of 69-67 yesterday for a 283 total.

Chuck Congdon of Tacoma, winner of almost everything but the Northwest open, finished at even-par 288, in tenth position.

Harry Givan of Seattle Golf Club, winner in 1942 (the last time the tournament was held here), was fourth among the amateurs at 296.

Like Storey's great round, the most spectacular shot of the tournament also went almost unnoticed. It was a 143-yard hole-in-one on the 11th by Harvey Hixson, Cottage Grove, Ore., professional. Hixson's shot landed about 12 feet in front of the pin and trickled

Two amateurs, Tom Storey of Seattle University and Bruce Richards of the University of Washington, tied for third at 281. Storey carded the lowest round of the tournament, a six-under-par 66, on the final round.

Duden took a four-stroke lead into the afternoon round, and watched it evaporate quickly before the withering charge of Eggers.

PLAYING IN THE same threesome with Duden, Eggers picked up two shots on the second hole with a 20-foot birdie putt as Duden took a bogey 5. Eggers pulled even when he made birdie putts of 15 and 25 feet at the third and fourth, and went into the lead with a 60-footer at the seventh.

At the ninth, Eggers knocked in a 2-footer for a birdie, but lost ground. Duden drove the 254-yard hole and rapped in a 25-foot putt for an eagle 2, his second of the day.

From there, Duden moved back into the lead to stay. He birdied the 10th and 11th, barely missing another eagle
