Your mirror can be invaluable in helping you detect key faults in your address position and

your swing. Look at your address position in profile (see illustration) and note these things. Do you have a proper flexing at the knees? There should be a slight bend. Is your back fairly straight and not too rounded? Do you look back or out to see your hands when you look down at them? You should look back slightly; otherwise you are reaching too much for the ball.

Then swing to the top of your backswing and again look in the mirror. The back of your left hand and your forearm should form a straight line. Your left shoulder should be under your chin. Your club should be parallel to the target line-not pointing to the left or right.

If your mirror indicates any these deficiencies in your swing, I suggest you see a competent teaching professional. It will be well worth a few dollars to put your swing back in the


