HOCKEY Montreal player insults French-speakers

Pardon his French, but Mike Keane says he didn't mean to offend anybody. The new captain of the Montreal Canadiens tried to quiet criticism yesterday after he clumsily ventured into one of the most sensitive subjects in the Canadian province of Quebec.

With training camp barely begun, he managed to outrage the team's French-speaking fans by asserting he doesn't need to learn their language.

"Everybody here speaks English," he told the French-language newspaper La Presse this week. "I don't see any problem."

Fans phoned local papers expressing shock at Keane's attitude, and a La Presse sports columnist called for another captain. Keane tried to explain himself at an impromptu

news conference after practice. "What people said about me not wanting to speak French is not true," he said. "I just don't speak French. If I said anything to offend anyone, I'm sorry. "I'm going to try to learn French - obviously now. It

will take some time.' Canadiens coach Jacques Demers said he choose Keane because he "plays hard and the other guys respect The Canadiens are by far the most revered sports institution in Quebec, which is heading toward a crucial

referendum Oct. 30 on whether to become independent Right-winger Teemu Selanne signed a new contract with the Winnipeg Jets. Selanne said he and the Jets had agreed in general on the deal, reportedly worth around \$3 million a year, but there was a problem over

Oilers free to move after '97 season

The Oilers will be free to leave Houston after the 1997 season after resolving their lawsuit with Harris County, the city and Astrodome USA. The agreement came after the parties negotiated all day and into the evening. U.S. District Judge Lynn N. Hughes signed the final consent decree around 9 p.m. The agreement calls for the Ollers to play all regular season and postseason home games in the Astrodome

through the end of the 1997 season. In exchange, "the county, city, and Astrodome USA commit without qualification not to sue, obstruct, impede or otherwise attempt to prevent the Oilers and (learn owner Bud) Adams from relocating the Oilers to another city at the end of the 1997 NFL football season," according to the decree.

For more than a year, Adams has campaigned for Houston taxpayers to build a new domed stadium with lucrative luxury boxes. Adams is negotiating with Nashville, Tenn., officials about moving his team to a 76,000-seat, open-air stadium

there for the 1998 season. The Chicago Bears signed rookle quarterback Steve Stenstrom from Stanford, a day after the Kansas City Chiefs signed him and tried to sneak him through waivers.

Rodeo cowboy dies after Pendleton mishap

Team roper Mike Boothe, 25, of Bishop, Calif., died of complications after breaking his left leg when his horse fell on him Tuesday in the Pendleton Round-Up. Boothe suffered an embolism when fatty tissues rentered a lung, a spokesman at St. Anthony Hospital

Boothe sustained four fractures when his horse fell on his left leg during the first day of the rodeo. His horse broke a leg and was destroyed. Boothe was taken by ambulance to the hospital, where he was diagnosed and fitted with a full-leg cast. The hospital staff said he appeared to be doing fine overnight and early yesterday morning. He lost consciousness late in the morning and

died shortly before noon. Top-seeded Thomas Muster recovered from a slow start to rout Cedric Pioline 7-5, 6-3 in the second round of the Romanian Open at Bucharest. The 2,325mile, 21-stage race continues along the Mediterranean coast today with a 148-mile leg from Marbella to Sevilla. including one top-ranked mountain pass, the course's
