

The Yanks apparently are "in," but the National League fight may be carried right up to the final day—September 30—when the two contenders clash at the Polo Grounds. That battle will break the lock-step and may decide the new National League champions.

## Soccer League And Gridiron Body In Wide Open Split

NEW YORK, Wednesday, Sept. 26 -A wide open split has developed between the United States Football Association and the American Soccer League over the league's action in suspending and fining three of its

suspending and fining three of its members.

The league suspended the New York Giants, Newark and Bethlehem for entering in the football association's championship tourney after the league had voted to remain out of the competition. Fines of \$1,000 on each club also were levied.

The association now has informed the league that unless the suspensions are lifted within twenty-four hours "drastic action" will be taken. This was interpreted to mean that the league would be ruled out of the national association.
