

MUELLER WILL NOT MEET RUBY

Buffalo Lad Injured and Forced to Withdraw, so Substitutes Are Named.

NEW YORK, Tuesday, Sept. 10.—Ruby Goldstein will no longer fight Freddie Mueller of Buffalo tonight at the Queensboro Stadium as scheduled. Ruby did not take another run-out, but Freddie did, and the East Side war all set to prove to a lot of skeptical friends that Goldstein was free of himself of the habit of ducking out on matches at the eleventh hour.

Mueller's manager sent word to Buffalo yesterday that his charge could not fight "because of a bad hand." When Matchmaker Al Weiss informed Ruby that Mueller will be ready to go September 24; Goldstein insisted that before he accepted the new date Mueller would have to agree with a substantial appearance fee.

As a headliner at the Queensboro tonight the substitute bout will be between Pal Silvers and Tony Vaccarella.
