SPECULATOR, N. Y., Saturday Sept. 21.—(A)—There's plenty of verbal battling going on about it, but Max Baer was determined today to take another leaf from the book of Gene Tunney, the man who never overlooked a bet, and fly down to fight Joe Louis in the Yankee Stadium Tuesday night. Tunney, who first made this tiny Adirondack town a fight camp, flew from here in a seaplane to the last hampionship defense of his career against Tom Heeney, in New York in 1928. He also flew from Strouds-burg, in the Pocono Mountains, to Philadelphia for his title triump! over Jack Dempsey in the rain of the Sesqui-Centennial Stadium in

Gene said then that flying was a gesture to upset Dempsey, who was so harassed by that time that he didn't care if Tunney came afoot or on horseback. Not until after Gene had retired was the reason for the flights, during which Tunney was violently airsick, revealed. lently airsick, revealed.
