Espinosa Wins Title In Great Golf Fight

YAKIMA, Wednesday, Sept. 27.—Al Espinosa of the Inglewood Country Club, Seattle, is the state open golf champion and if ever a player deserved the crown this broad-shouldered lad from the Sound city did for the plucky uphill fight that he put up yesterday when he overtook the leader, Joe Novak of Spokane, and won on the last nine five strokes to the good, with a grand total of 252 for the two days' play of seventy-two holes.

Novak took second money with 287; Neil Christian, third, with 291. Jack Hueston from the Cheasty Golf School, Seattle, came next with 335. Don Stein and Clark Speirs each scored a total of 299, being the leading amateurs.

The Espinosa-Novak team carried the gallery and it was a battle that the spectators will talk over for many days to come.



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
