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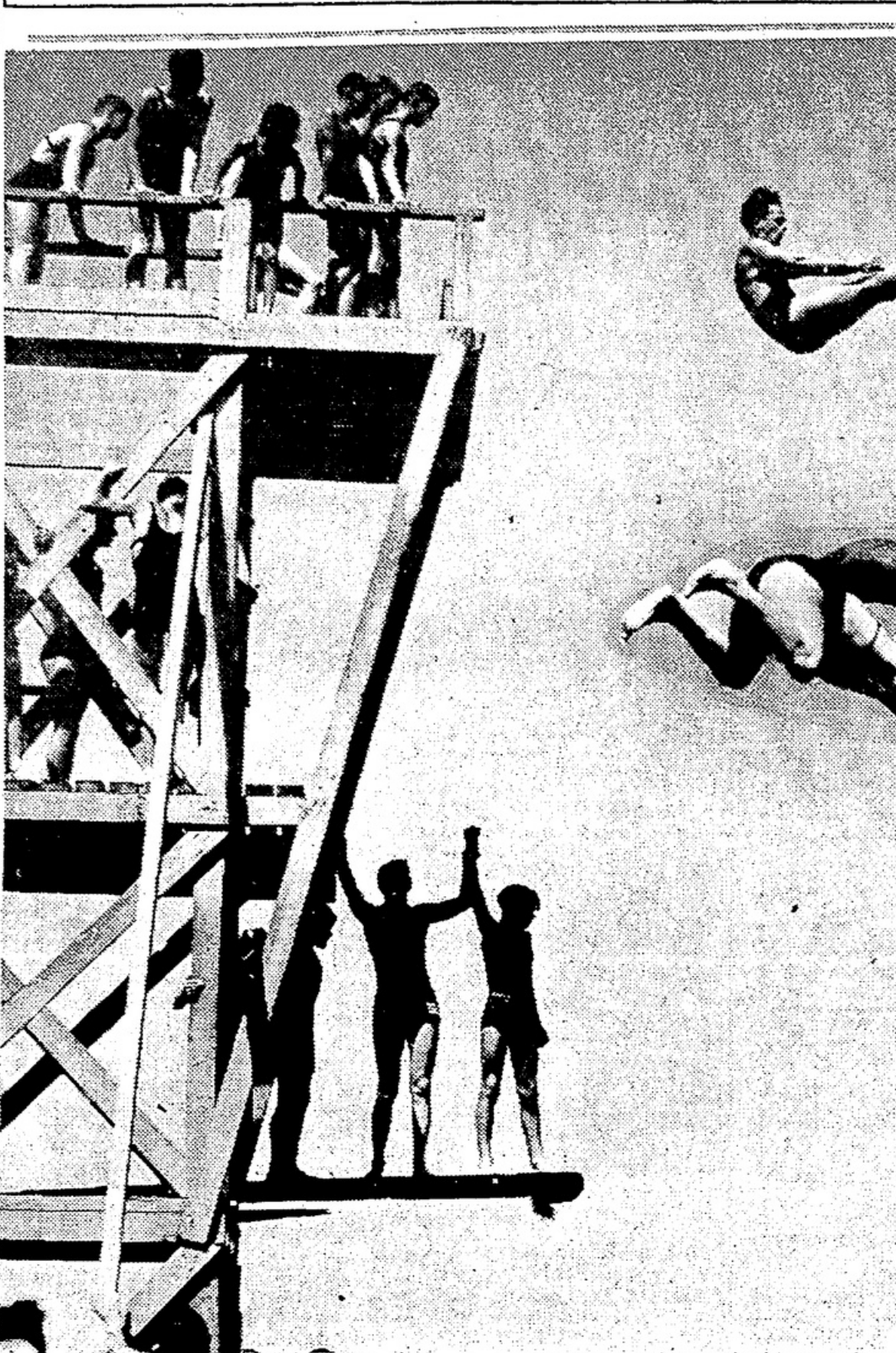

CAL-NEVA, Wednesday, July 19.—William Harrison Dempsey, former heavyweight boxing champion, and his bride, the former Hannah Williams of the stage, stopped briefly here today en route to San Francisco and Los Angeles.

The Dempseys had a lodge room from the Cal-Neva Club on the California-Nevada State line and spent nearly two hours last night posing for press and news red photographers.

Although the pair previously had announced they intended to be married in Reno last night, they stopped at Elko, while en route from Salt Lake City to Reno and were married yesterday morning.

"I'm all through with the stage," Mrs. Dempsey said last night. "I will concentrate on being a good wife to Jack."

She is the former wife of Roger Wolff Kahn of New York. She obtained a divorce from Kahn several months ago in Reno, where Dempsey obtained a divorce from Estelle Taylor of the films in 1931.

Dempsey said he and his bride would remain here for several days before leaving for San Francisco and Los Angeles, where Baer is to make a motion picture. He said they might stop for a few days at Hoffman's ranch near Sacramento.

**U. S. Davis Cup Team Confident Netmen Think They'll Beat England**

AUTEUIL, France, Wednesday, July 19.—It may be overconfidence, but America's Davis Cup tennis stars are convinced they can sweep to decisive victory over England in interspersed final starting in Roland Garros Stadium Friday, and thus advance into the challenge round against France next week. Not only are Ellsworth Vines, Wilmer Allison, George Lott and John Van Ryn confident of victory in the series but they decline to concede England a single triumph in advance.

The abundant injury Fred Perry suffered last week when England defeated Australia in the European zone finals and his present doubtful condition led most experts to pick the United States to win without particular trouble.

In shape, the erratic Perry conceivably might meet neither Vines or Allison on one of his good days, but H. W. (Bunny) Austin does not seem to have the strength to withstand either of the two American angles aces, and Lott and Van Ryn look like a better doubles combination than either Perry and George Patrick Hughes, or Hughes and H. G. N. Lee.

## Campbell Drops Out of State Amateur

### STALENESS HITS 'SCOTTY' SO ACE QUILTS TOURNEY

SPOKANE COUNTRY CLUB, Spokane, Wednesday, July 19.—Albert (Scotty) Campbell, Seattle's golfing sensation, decided today to drop out of the Washington State Amateur golf tournament. He entered the qualifying rounds this morning and scored a 55, two over par, on the outward nine, but informed the Associated Press at the turn that he would not turn in a card.

"I am going stale, and feel that if I continue to play the rest of this week I would not have a chance in the National Public Links tournament at Portland next month," he said.

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### SOTHORON WILL BOSS TEAM FOR NOW, SAYS BALL

ST. LOUIS, Wednesday, July 19.—Bill Killefer, manager of the St. Louis Browns, today telegraphed his resignation from Washington. President Phil Ball announced Al Sothoron, who has been coach, would act as manager temporarily.

President Ball, who is in a hospital, said he would take steps to obtain a new manager when he is released in a few days.

Ball had no comment on Killefer's resignation but it has been no secret that he was displeased with the showing of the Browns, who are in last place in the American League. Ball announced last Saturday that Killefer was through "as far as signing players or formulating plans for the Browns is concerned."

Both Ball and Killefer at that time denied reports that Killefer would manage the Boston Red Sox in 1934. Ball said Boston had not asked permission to deal with Killefer as would be necessary under league rules.

Killefer became Brown manager in 1930. Previously he had been a coach under Manager Dan Hooley. Prior to that he was a coach of the St. Louis Cardinals under Manager Rogers Hornsby.

In 1929, the last year under Hooley, the Browns finished fourth. Under Killefer the club sank to sixth place in 1930, rose to fifth in 1931 and last year fell back to sixth.

After a bad start, the team played fairly good ball after the middle of May this year, seemed to be trying hard and made a favorable impression despite the sale ofatcher Kierkegaard, a strong factor.

Ball declined to intimate his plans for a permanent manager. The name of Rogers Hornsby has been mentioned and it is understood the Cardinals could be induced to arrange for transfer of Hornsby if the Browns want him.

Sothoron also might be considered for permanent manager. He at one time led the Louisville club of the American Association successfully for three seasons, winning one pennant.

A great pitcher in his prime, Sothoron was one of the props of the Browns staff several years ago. His last notable pitching effort was in 1928 for the Cards. He is 40 years old and has been identified with baseball since 1912.

Bill Killefer, a rather in his playing days, is a brother of Wade Killefer, former manager of the Seattle Indians who now is in charge of the Indianapolis team of the American Association.
