Revson Has New 'Weapon' For Sports-Car Scramble

When one team — Roger Penske's — begins running away with the racing marbles the other teams begin scrambling.
The latest "weapon" in the speed war among sports cars will be an all-aluminum Ford engine prepared by the Carroll Shelby team for use in Peter Revson's Lola for Sunday's United States Road Racing Championship event at Kent.
BILL DONER, representing Shelby at yesterday's U. S. R. C. press luncheon, said, "Penske and Mark Donohue think they're getting \$80-900 horsepower out of their 427 Chevrolet engine. We'd like to see if we can get that many, or maybe more out of our plant. It was a real scramble to make it with the new engine. We didn't know we would do it until Monday night."
Doner went on to explain that the all-aluminum block never has been raced. Hopefully, if all goes well, Revson will take a test drive in the car tomorrow at Pacific Raceways.

ning ride at Lexington, Ohio, in the Trans-Am sedan series. He followed that up last Sunday with a victory at Bridgehampton, N. Y.
Although, Donohue is on a hot streak, John Cannon of Montreal is conceding nothing here Sunday. "I think I have the fastest McLaren," Cannon said. The racing veteran feels high-speed racing requires both "logic and optimism," to produce winning results.
A FILM OF a 1966 race at Watkins Glen, N. Y., was shown at the luncheon. It involved a collision between Cannon and Donohue. Cannon tangled with another car and spun in the middle of the course. Donohue, coming up over a hill at 125 miles an hour, had little time to react and no time to get by safely. His car sheared off the front half of Cannon's Porsche and caught fire. Neither was hurt.
Larry McCue, director of Sunday's race, announced the entry yesterday of Bud Morley, Denver attorney who drives a Lola-Chev. This brought the field to 25 entries.

Student Beats Teacher in State Open

Joe Colello is the type of golfer who might normally be found on the practice tee, taking a lesson from a veteran professional such as Al Mengert.
Yesterday, the roles were reversed, and Colello, a four-handicapper from Rainier Golf Club, showed Mengert something new as he defeated the Tacoma pro in a one-hole playoff to win the Washington open championship at Overlake Golf Club.
Colello, 25, who works in his father's grocery store, refused to collapse under the pressure of four birdies by Mengert on the last 11 holes.
Colello made a fine play on the 18th for a par 4 to the Mengert for first place. Each shot a final-round 71, even par, for 54-hole totals of 208, four under par and seven strokes ahead of their closest pursuers.

ON THE EXTRA hole, a 407-yard dogleg, Colello followed a mediocre drive with a superb No. 6-iron shot which, carried about 180 yards and stopped six feet behind the pin.
Mengert had hit a tremendous drive. He followed with a No. 3-iron shot which landed about three feet short of the flag and spun back 15 feet below the hole.
From there, Mengert's putt just slid past the cup. Colello, betraying no signs of nervousness, rapped in his six-footer for a birdie 3 to capture his first championship ever.
Colello's victory was the first by an amateur in the Washington open since Don Taylor of Ingleswood won the title in 1958. It also denied Mengert a fourth state crown. He won three in a row beginning in 1963.
"I'm a hacker," Colello said gleefully following his upset victory. "I can't possibly win this. I had to be a thousand-to-one shot."

Joe, who only a few weeks ago carried a five handicap, said he did not become nervous.
"I was psyched up, I guess," he said. "I'm in shock. But thank God I didn't know I needed that 4 on 18 to tie."

MENGERT SAID he had felt certain a 209 total would win.
"I'd hate to give that fellow two shots a side," Al said. "I played as well as I

can, considering the toughness of the course. Those pin placements and that rough made the course very difficult."
Colello, after starting the final round even with Mengert, opened a four-stroke lead by the seventh hole. He birdied the first hole with a 40-foot putt. Mengert bogeyed the third, where he three-putted for the only time in the tournament, and suffered a double-bogey 6 at the seventh, where he hit into the rough, then over the green.
From there, Mengert charged back. He birdied the eighth and ninth, then drew even when Colello took a double bogey at the tenth.
Colello, who has arms like a blacksmith, sank a 25-footer for a birdie at the 13th. Mengert matched that with a 15-foot birdie putt at the 14th, then bogeyed the 15th when he hit into a trap. Mengert drew even again at the 16th, rolling in a 10-footer for another birdie.

At the 18th, Mengert already had holed out with a par 4 when Colello, playing in the threesome behind, came up the fairway. Joe hit his approach shot left of the green, made a fine chip shot about six feet past and sank a difficult putt which curled slightly against the grain.

CONSIDERING THE difficulty of the course and the adverse weather, both closing rounds were remarkable — particularly for Colello, who never had won a tournament. He had played only in the Oregon open and Pacific Coast amateur, both times missing the cut.
All other challengers fell badly off the pace. Bob Du-den of Portland picked up second money of \$800 with a closing 73, tying an amateur, Wes Wilkening of the University of New Mexico, for third place at 216, three over par.

Bob Whisman of Everett, Les Moe of Yakima and Jerry Hedding, an amateur from Rialto, Calif., who is stationed at Fort Lewis, shared fifth place at 217.

Only two players other than Mengert and Colello matched par yesterday — George Holland of Overlake and Doug Campbell of Tacoma.

Would-Be Thieves Cause Death of 9,000 Cutthroat

Persons apparently intent on stealing large game fish on display at a state fish hatchery near Oso in North-ern Snohomish County caused the death of more than 9,000 searun cutthroat and rainbow trout early yesterday.
James L. Dingwall, a hatchery employee, said the thieves diverted water from a trough in which the display fish were kept. This also shut off the water into a raceway where young trout were being reared.
Hatchery employees counted 7,956 dead searun cutthroat, about half of the cutthroat in the hatchery. They averaged 9 inches in length and weighed a total of 888 pounds.
Workers also counted 1,188 rainbow, all of legal size and ready to be planted in

streams this summer. Dingwall estimated that 10 to 15 per cent of the hatchery's rainbow population died.
Dingwall said a number of display fish, weighing 3 and 4 pounds, were taken.
The mishap occurred between 1 and 5 a. m. yesterday, he said.
Dingwall said he believed the thieves did not intend to kill the young fish.

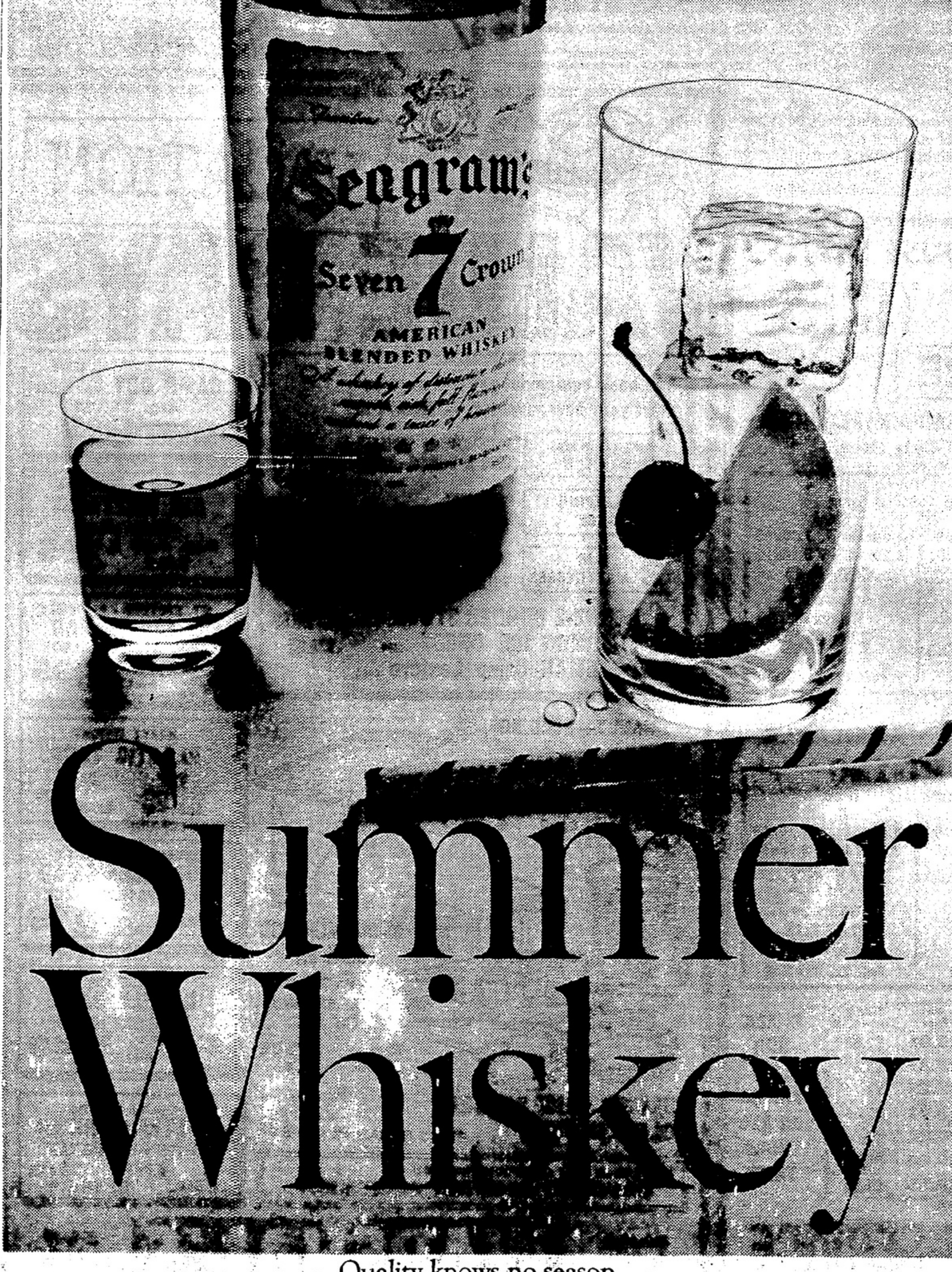
