Don Bies should have known he didn't have a chance after the ninth hole yesterday at Inglewood Golf and Country Club.

That was the same hole where a cat walked across the fairway about 50 yards in front of Bies as he teed off. He watched it run away when his drive sizzled past the animal.

It was probably nothing. The cat never returned to bother Bies. A few minutes later, on the ninth green, Bies missed by inches on a three-foot putt as he bogeyed the hole. And, like the cat, he then watched his one-stroke lead over then-second-place Mike Gove disappear.

Bies fell back on 11th It was probably nothing. His lead returned on the 10th, when Bies scored a par and Gove

bogeyed.

But Gove birdied the 11th hole while Bies again shot par, and his lead was gone again. Gove won the Washington State Open, finishing at eightunder par for the three-day event.

Bies, the Seattle pro, shot an opening-round 67 on the par-73 course and led the field from the start until yesterday's ninth hole. He finished second to Gove, two strokes back.

For the 28-year-old Gove, it was his first tournament win since June of 1983, when he captured the New Hampshire Classic. He's played in few tournaments since, instead keeping busy on the TPS

Decathlete makes exit quicker than his arrival

The veins in Matt McPherson's neck wouldn't relax yesterday, and the pain was so intense that the skin on his forehead was as tight as dried leather.

It was the opening day of the National Junior Olympics Track and Field Championships at Husky Stadium, and it was supposed to be his day.

But McPherson, a recent graduate of Bellevue High School, may have won and lost on his first event of the decathlon competition.
